

SNEAD. CARTER HIGHLIGHT BENEFIT GOLF TOURNAMENT

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Golf legend Sam Snead, baseball Hall of Famer Brooks Robinson and New York Mets catcher Gary Carter each led five-person scramble teams at a pro- celebrity charity event Monday at Atlantis Country Club.

Ken Still, a PGA Senior Tour pro, led the winning group that finished ahead of 23 teams at the Suburban Bank/Growing Together Charity Classic. Still's team combined for a 58.

Another senior pro, Art Wall Jr., led the second-place team that finished two strokes behind the leaders.

Sam Snead's team finished seventh overall with a score of 62. Carter's team finished in a four-way tie for 11th with a 64. The group led by ex-NFL quarterback Norm Snead shot a 66, ahead of Robinson's team (67).

The event benefitted Growing Together, Inc., a comprehensive drug and alcohol rehabilitation center for adolescents in Lake Worth.

"Everybody felt good about the cause they were golfing for," Atlantis Country Club pro Jim Simon said. "We watched a 12-minute tape about Growing Together, and it brought tears to everyone's eyes.

"I think by next year we'll have even more pros and more celebrities out here."

Simon said the cool weather did not effect the size of the galleries.

"We had quite a few people watching," Simon said. "They came to see Sam and Gary and they enjoyed themselves."

There was a three-way tie for third place at 61.

The third-place teams were led by Susan Biago, the teaching professional at Lost Tree Village Golf Course in North Palm Beach; Dan Pasquariello, a golf professional from Hawaii; and senior pro Pete Brown.

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CHINESE STUDENTS SHARE HERITAGE THROUGH MUSIC, DANCE

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Aprogram of classical and contemporary Chinese music and dance will be presented at Florida Atlantic University on Sunday in the University Center Auditorium in Boca Raton. Sixteen students of the Chinese Youth Goodwill Mission from Taiwan will stop at FAU during a 55-day tour of 15 university campuses.

"They're like ambassadors," said Eddie Bartholomew, public relations director for the university. "The program is an exchange of information and the show is very colorful."

The program, "An Adventure in Chinese Songs and Dance," is co-sponsored by the FAU Foundation and the Cultural Division, Coordinating Council for North American Affairs.

The students will share their heritage through their music and dance, which is entertaining to children and adults, Bartholomew said.

This performance will be one of three Florida visits for the group; the others will take place in Gainesville and Tallahassee.

FAU students will be admitted at no charge with a valid student ID. Tickets are \$4.20 and \$2.10, including tax, and are available at the ticket office, 393-3758.

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The 13th Annual Florida Heritage Festival is on its way to the South Florida Fairgrounds in West Palm Beach with animals, arts and crafts, wagon rides and lots of entertainment.

And, instead of a country and western format, the focus will be a bit different this year, said Jeff Chabon, director of promotions at Fantasma Productions in West Palm Beach.

"The motif this year will be modeled after the '50s and '60s," he said. "There will be a sock hop in the Beer Hall on Saturday (Nov. 14) after the Temptations."

The festival, scheduled for Nov. 11 to 15, will include: a concert by Greg Allman at 8 p.m. Nov. 11; the Association at 8 p.m. Nov. 12; Championship Wrestling at 8 p.m. Nov. 13; two shows by the Temptations, at 4 and 8 p.m. Nov. 14; and the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band at 7 p.m. Nov. 15.

Kustom's of South Florida will display about 10 classic cars from the 1950s and '60s and, on Nov. 14, a customizing exhibition, "chopping a top exhibition," Chabon said.

Other attractions planned range from a Florida folklife exhibit and a children's petting zoo to horse-drawn wagon rides and an international food pavilion.

Admission into the fairgrounds will be \$5 for adults, \$3.50 for senior citizens, and free for children under 12. An advance five-day pass is available for \$12.50 at all Bass and Select-A-Seat Outlets. For information, call Fantasma Productions, 832-6397.
