County Administrator Richard Kelton, who was supposed to have filed within 30 days of his June 1 appointment date, had not filed as of Friday afternoon.

County Atty. Peter Dunbar, who also is chairman of the Pasco County Charter Commission, and is required to file in both capacities, had not filed as of late Friday.

THERE IS A lengthy list of members of various boards who have resigned recently, many of them in protest against the 1974 disclosure act. Newton said they are still required by law to file, but pointed out, "the only penalty for failure to file is removal from office, and it doesn't make much difference if a person has already resigned."

The law applies to all public officials, elected and appointed, unless they are ap-pointed to strictly advisory boards that have no binding decision-making power.

PASSAGE OF THE law and its subsequent amendments led to an immediate uproar throughout the state among officials who charged it was a violation of privacy and would leave officials open to nuisance lawauits and extortion and expose them and their families to the possibility of being before the control of the control of

Interpretation of the portion of the law defining "strictly advisory" boards has led to confusion, as had the law's frequently misunderstood provision that officials have only to disclose sources of income and not dollar amounts.

The law requires officeholders and ap-intees to list all income sources that compointees to itst all income sources that com-prise at least 10 per cent of their gross in-comes, excluding dividends, interest, guar-dianships, alimony, child support, retire-ment or disability compensation and com-pensation derived from government ser-

Campaign contributions are excluded,

but have to be listed separately during the

campaign.

INCOME SOURCES of business that constitute at least 15 per cent of the person's income must be reported if he owns a material interest (at least 10 per cent of the assets or stock) but only sources that produced at least 15 per cent of the gross income of the busines.

Persons who receive at least 10 per cent of the net distributed income of chartered banks, savings and loan associations, small loan companies, liquor establishments, bet-ting establishments, utilities, cemetery or insurance companies, mortgage and title insurance companies, credit unions or any-thing controlled by the Public Service Commission or given a municipal franchise

Individuals filing also must report any outstanding or pest debts that were acquired at a preferential interest rate and any debt that exceeded the individual's net

Persons required to file have the option of filing copies of their federal income tax forms, along with a financial statement of the type required by banks when applying for a loan
