STUDENT LEADERS JOIN WAR ON DRUG ABUSE

Convinced that peer pressure is the weapon needed to fight the drug war, Seminole County high school leaders are putting together an elaborate anti- drug program for National Drug and Alcohol Education and Prevention Week in October.

Twelve student council presidents and vice presidents are organizing a speaker series, group discussions and video presentations at the county's high schools and possibly middle schools from Oct. 5 through 11, said Bill Hapiuk, president of the Seminole County Association of Student Councils.

"So many people talk a lot and get nothing done," said Hapiuk, also Lake Brantley High School student body president. "This is a positive, student-to- student approach."

Among the speakers the students hope to bring to the schools are former Miami Dolphins football star Mercury Morris, who is a recovering drug addict, and students who are ex-drug users.

They also are counting on speeches and films from members of Mothers Against Drunk Driving and Students Against Driving Drunk.

Law enforcement officials are expected to talk to students about their experiences with drug dealers, about penalties for drug abuse and about types of drugs and drug paraphernalia.

The climax of the program will be Oct. 10 when students plan to distribute T-shirts featuring "Just Say No," the slogan popularized by Nancy Reagan in her anti-drug crusade.

Students already have support for the program from Families Together, a non-profit drug education group. Families Together also is planning a more extensive educational program at the county's high schools this year, to include support meetings, video and other programs.

The students also hope to receive support from such drug counseling groups as Straight Inc. and the Grove Counseling Center Inc., Winter Springs.

Grove director Larry Visser said the program is a "great idea" and he would be pleased to help the students.

The association of student councils launched the idea after finding the widely publicized Lake Mary High School anti-drug pledge too harsh, Hapiuk said. In a letter to the school board earlier this month, the students proposed a countywide drug education program in place of the school's contract, which says students must stay clear of drugs on and off campus and submit to drug testing if they are suspected drug users.

Failure to sign the contract, which Lake Mary students will receive later this month, could result in suspension from a team or club.

The school board earlier this month gave preliminary approval to a procedure enacting the contract. The procedure refers suspected drug users in Lake Mary's extracurricular activities for treatment and testing. A final vote is expected in October.

Lake Mary is training its coaches and club sponsors to detect drug users and is organizing a series of drug education programs for students and parents.

Meanwhile, politicians and principals are working with the Grove and other treatment programs to come up with a countywide drug prevention program in schools, government and community organizations.
